Message from Our V.P ...




Hello All.

A new studio manager will be hired within the next few months, possibly by spring quarter. However, things are moving smoothly in the interim thanks to Maile Osagawa, the program manager for Community Arts. She is in the studio often and is coordinating the

running of our classes as well as the day-to-day business. We have a new studio assistant, Karen, who is working diligently to keep all of our wares moving through the kilns. Darren and Roger are helping with the firings as well.

As for next year, Open Studio will continue to be offered in "blocks" for at least the Winter quarter. You can sign up for more than one block to schedule your time in the studio. Also, your pieces can be quickly checked on during the week. Check in with the Safety Lead (monitor) at any OS to move your pieces.

The new Blaauw kiln is a success! It is very versatile and fires quickly. It has improved the through put noticeably. More good kiln news on the horizon: Walnut Creek will be purchasing another, larger Blaauw kiln in the next couple of years to replace two of our struggling kilns. CAG is donating \$21,000 toward that purchase. I am quite proud of our ability to help the studio improve with up to date equipment and supplies.



That being said, our membership is understandably down from pre-COVID levels. Let's try to spread the word about the guild within our own classes. Explain about the perks we receive with that membership as well as the good work we are doing in the community and the studio. EMPTY BOWL PROJECT by Mona Moxley

For many years, Community Arts and the Clay Arts Guild has participated in the annual Empty Bowls fundraising project with the Food Bank of Contra Costa and Solano County. This is an important fund raising event for the Food Bank.


At the studio, we started working on this project in late fall of 2019. We set aside two days after the studio was closed in November, and volunteers came in one day and threw or hand-built bowls, then several days later another group came in to trim the bowls. After bisque firing, Ande Bennett worked with eager glazers to glaze and finish the bowls. Many individuals also contributed bowls.



Due to Covid, there was no fundraising event in fall, 2020. In September of this year, however, we were able to complete the Empty Bowls project for 2021 and ended up donating 198 lovely bowls to the Food Bank. In past years, multiple organizations have contributed bowls, however, due to shut-downs, Community Arts/Clay Arts were the only contributors this year.

The format for the program was different this year. Rather than an in-person event, there was a drive through pick up of the bowls before a virtual event in October. Each ceramic bowl was packaged with a recipe card and Food Bank impact info card, together with a bottle of water and some discount coupons. (Photo at right.)

The Empty Bowls event raised approximately \$53,000 which is equivalent to 106,000 meals. There will be a video that will be uploaded to the Food Bank's You-Tube channel as well.

We could not have done it without your help. For 2021-2022, we are going to follow the successful format we used back in the fall of 2019, and set aside several afternoons when the studio is not open for throwing, hand building and trimming bowls for the project. Dates will be announced.
