Gary Guglielmino by Ann Henderson

The studio has lost a wonderful friend. If you knew Gary you were rewarded by having met an amazingly cheerful individual: everyone he met was his friend. Gary could find the positive aspects in any situation. Even faced with a terminal disease, his smile and spirit never waned, his laugh was contagious, and he always found the upbeat side of things. In spite of experiencing balance issues near his end, he talked his wonderful wife, Dawn, into bringing him to visit in the studio during one of our classes. He sat and watched a demo, talked and laughed with the students, and even mentioned coming back to finish glazing his pieces.



Gary was a medical doctor – an anesthesiologist, and I know people often asked him medical questions. He was always polite, responsive and never appeared annoyed with questions. When someone was worried about an upcoming surgery, he was always supportive. He finally retired less than a year ago and was planning on doing a lot of traveling – and potting too, of course.

It was 2006 when he joined the studio and fell in love with creating pottery. I remember seeing him over a long period of time working with about one pound of clay. I asked him why he never used more, and he explained that his teacher suggested mastering one pound first. Shortly after, I talked him through throwing a three-pound plate. It was exciting for me to see how pleased he was with the results. From that point on it was all sizes of bowls, cups, pitchers, more plates and even a couple of teapots!

If you have not had the opportunity to attend one of our visiting artist workshops, I highly recommend you do so.

Right after that we packed up for the California Conference for the Advancement of Ceramics (CCACA). It was my first time attending and I will definitely be back next year. So many beautiful pieces on display and it is really fun to see the creativity coming out of the schools and studios.

The next weekend was our CAG Spring Pottery Sale. The rain did not keep away our loyal customers and by Sunday the clouds had diminished. We had a very busy weekend with the kids' clay and card making tables, which were very popular. A special thanks goes out to Doug Tambling and his jazz band for providing wonderful live music on Saturday to brighten our spirits. Thank you to all the volunteers that made the day possible! We had a very suc-



cessful sale, despite the weather not cooperating. Twenty three artists participated and we sold just over \$10,000 in two days, selling 435 items ranging from \$4 to \$75. We collected \$2,500 for CAG that will go toward scholarships, studio equipment and CAG events.

The schedule for summer session has just been posted on the website (refer to page 6) and class registration opens **May 24th at noon**. Classes are sure to fill up quickly!



Master Potter Workshop with Deidem Mert by Donna Cowan



Deidem Mert what a kick in the pants! Our most recent Master Potter was very entertaining as well as informational. She's like that little pop of color on your pot that draws your attention. Didem was accompanied by her recently adopted sidekick, Mama,

who supported Diedem by sleeping quietly in her carrier throughout the workshop!

Although Diedem's passion is decorating, she also shared tricks for hand building and throwing. Having taught many classes and workshops, her approach to building offered simplified techniques in a step-by-step approach. Her clay veneer technique, adapted from her woodworking father's veneer process, creates a unique decorating effect. It was fascinating to watch and learn how she did it.



The workshop flowed from hand building to throwing to decorating, back and forth, however the timing of the clay allowed. From a distance it may have looked like Didem was unorganized, but her presentation style had an efficient creative flow to

it, belying that initial look. She kept us entertained with stories that may have seemed unrelated to clay (like early morning plumbing woes) but were a wonderful insight into the artist that she is. Her present decorating style relies heavily on stencils, so she spent a good bit of time talking about that process. And she has some definite opinions about certain traditional opinions/ways of being a potter held by some potters. I particularly enjoyed her approach to and opinions about making handles.

Didem was open to a wide range of questions, from those about technique to ones about marketing. She made it clear that she believes in being efficient with both time and materials. Her workshop was like that shot of adrenaline to kick-start a creative process. Didem is definitely a modern woman in her clay-play, professional style, and whose work also gives a hint at her Turkish heritage.

We are fortunate that Brandon's grad school connection with Didem and her living so close by in Sebastopol brought her to us. The work that she brought to sell was gorgeous, definitely gallery quality, and because she did not have to ship it,




Puddling Plates

What are Butterfly Puddling Plates? Butterfly Puddling is when a butterfly visits and gathers nutrients from moist soil or a small puddle. A plate provides a place for them to do this.

They use their long tongues to deliver fluids and minerals into their mouths. Butterflies cannot land on water to drink.





- 2) Pour enough water into the container to moisten the soil and lightly sprinkle some sea salt or Epsom salt on the surface. Butterflies need salt in their diets.
- In hot weather, moisten the soil manually, or place the puddling plate near a sprinkler or have a drip irrigation line run across it.
- Great locations are near flowers that attract the butterflies.
