One of the preschool classes through community arts would like to partner with us for a very fun creative venture. The four year old students have created monsters drawn or created with construction paper, and their fabulous teachers, Kristin Birdwell and



Bobbie Ireland, would love for us to make a 3-D sculpture out of clay for each child's work.

SODA KILN Firing Opportunity!

As a thank you to CAG for helping fund this project, I am offering all current CAG members a chance to participate in the inaugural firings. I am planning on doing two or three firings this quarter in order to dial in the kiln. I cannot guarantee the results of these first couple firings, however. Students can bring four or five pieces, ranging in size and shape. Studio size guidelines still apply.



The first firing will happen Friday, January 17th. All work should be placed on the wooden soda rack (back by the soda kiln) by Thursday, January 16th at noon. Additional firings with be announced later. Please place work on the soda rack, so that I can judge when the next firing will be.

Soda firing is a unique process where a solution of water and soda ash is sprayed into the kiln at peak temperature. This results in the soda ash volatilizing on the surface of the work, creating an asymmetric change in your clay, slip or glaze.

When creating work for the soda kiln, here are a few ideas and requirements.

- All work must be bisque fired first
- All work must be wadded. Wadding is a clay like mixture that must be applied to the bottom of every piece that goes into the soda kiln. Glue 3-5 small balls of wadding to the bottom of your work. Wadding is located on the soda shelves in the glaze area.
- · Any one of our clays can be used
- · Work can be glazed, slipped or raw
- Soda slips are located on the shelf in the glaze area (There are not test tiles for all. This will happen in the first couple firings) Can be applied to bone dry greenware or bisque.
- Our regular glazes will work. There are no test tiles of this yet.
- Raw (no glaze). If it is a functional piece, I would still put a liner glaze but nothing needs to be done to the outside.

Burnishing tool

I found this burnishing stone on Amazon for under \$10 and it works so much better than a rock for smoothing

groggy clay or burnishing pieces when leather hard. It is advertised as a tool for skin care. It has all the different contours I need to get into the small spots as well as nice larger curves for the body of the piece. It is very comfortable to hold and keeps my hand from cramping after extended times of burnishing.

ICE SKATING RINK:

The rink will be down and out by Saturday, February 8th. Until it's gone, please arrive early to class in order to find a parking spot.

PARKING:

2024 parking passes are still valid. A follow up email will be sent out when I receive the new 2025 passes.

You are allowed to park for 3 hours in the Civic Park parking lot. If you are registered to an open studio before or after your class that you will be attending, you will need to get a parking sticker. Students who have two consecutive classes or one class after another at the Ceramic Studio can qualify. This does not include extra loading or unloading time.

If you have a parking pass, you can also park for free in the library lower parking garage from 10 am-4 pm (while Ice rink is in the studio parking lot).

CLAY:

Students can purchase clay online, before or during class. Monitors are not allowed to issue clay. Please pick up clay from your instructor. Students are allowed two bags of clay per class. Four bags maximum. No outside clay is allowed in the studio.

STUDIO:

All bisqueware and finished work from Fall 24 quarter will be outback by the raku kilns. Last day to pick up this work will be Saturday, February 1st
