THE NEW STUDIO SODA KILN By Wendy Schmidt





Early this year, Brandon Lipe generously offered all CAG members a unique soda firing opportunity. During soda firing, sodium bicarbonate (baking soda) and water are introduced into the kiln around 2300F and the soda vapor combines with clay to form a unique glaze. Many members took advantage of the soda kiln firings and educational discussions Brandon hosted as he unloaded the kiln. While unloading the kiln, Brandon provided his insights on the outcome of each piece based upon surface treatment materials, clay body and position within in the kiln. Pieces that leveraged the specially designed soda slips and glazes yielded the most unique results and surface variations.

Brandon shared the importance of thoughtful surface treatment, encouraged students to embrace the asymmetrical variation created by the kiln's atmosphere and awareness that each firing of the kiln will result in different results. Lastly, remember to attach wadding directly to bisque/ untreated surface! A special thank you to Brandon for this hands-on learning opportunity as our studio kicks-off a new soda firing chapter.

CCACA Conference

On April 25th – 26th, the John Natsoulas Gallery will be hosting the California Conference for the Advancement of Ceramic Arts (CCACA) CCACA in downtown Davis, CA. CCACA Our studio has a long history of exhibiting our ceramic artworks alongside 35+ other art centers, universities and colleges. There will be six artists demoing over the two days. We'll have a designated space and it's a great opportunity to showcase what we do here in our studio. It's also a great opportunity to see what other studios are making and to bridge the gap with our California neighbors.

I am inviting all student artists to submit up to three pieces to be considered and juried in this year's exhibition; the work doesn't have to be made this quarter but within the last two years. The jury process will happen online via email. You can submit three images (jpg or pdf format) to my email address lipe@ communityarts.org subject: CCACA). Each image must have your name, title of piece, year made, price or NFS (not for sale), and any other info that helps explain the work. I would like a majority of the work to be for sale. The jpegs/images of the work don't have to be professionally documented; they just need to be clear enough so we can see some details and over-all form of the work.

SUBMISSIONS OF IMAGES ARE DUE TO ME BY APRIL 4th. Once the pieces are selected, the student artists will be notified via email. Selections will be made, and students will be notified by April 7th.

Please see below the expectations of exhibiting student artists:

1. Student artist work that is selected must be well packaged (wrapped) and boxed with name on box.

2. Wrapped and boxed work must be delivered by 5pm on April 18th (you can leave the work with your instructor or me to place in the office).

3. Each student artist will be required to help with the show. When showing up for your shift, arrive 15-30 minutes early to allow for parking. We will need volunteers to keep an eye on our exhibition; (Fri, Sat,) Each student artist will have two shifts (each shift is 2 hours) --- subject to change based on how many student artists attend the show. Times and signups will be posted as we get closer to the conference.

4. Student artists do not have to pay for the conference, other student exhibitions, including ours, are always free to the public. However, access to the lectures, panel discussions and demonstrations are only for paid attendees. I encourage many of you to attend the lectures anddemos. Day and Multiday passes are available for purchase.

5. Work does sell; patrons who buy something must have a check or exact cash. They can pick up the work at 4pm, Saturday April 29th, after the show.

6.There is no insurance on the work exhibited; we have had no issues in the past: someone is always at the space during the day and the building is locked after business hours.
